American Red Cross - Go to redcross.org/shelter to find a shelter or call 1-800-RED-CROSS (1-800-733-2767) if you need assistance - 24 hours a day.

Salvation Army – The Salvation Army provides emergency financial assistance for rent and utilities to help households prevent homelessness. Because each community is unique, the details of financial assistance programs vary between our different commands. There are requirements for assistance that vary by location. FEMA - Apply for Disaster Assistance

The fastest way to apply is through <u>DisasterAssistance.gov</u>. You can also apply through the <u>FEMA mobile</u> app or by calling the FEMA Helpline at 800-621-3362. If you use a video relay service, captioned telephone service, or other communication services, please provide FEMA the specific number assigned for that service.

NCCare360 <u>https://nccare360.org/</u> - Help with food insecurity, housing instability, lack of transportation access, or other non-medical social needs. NCCARE360 is the first statewide coordinated care network that better connects individuals to local services and resources.

NC Dept of Public Safety <u>https://www.ncdps.gov/our-organization/emergency-management/disaster-recovery/individual-assistance</u> Program include:

- Individuals who face displacement from their homes due to disaster-related income loss.
- Homes that are inaccessible due to road, bridge, and culvert or driveway washout;
- High quality inspections of disaster damaged dwellings as the basis for determining the kinds and amounts of assistance to be provided to individuals and families.
- Processing services for disaster applicants to give assistance as quickly as possible while ensuring proper stewardship of federal funds and;
- Providing housing resources through the state of North Carolina or FEMA for disaster victims.

Emergency Assistance (Short-Term Financial Assistance for Families in Crisis) - Work First is North Carolina's Temporary Assistance for the Needy Families program. Families who are experiencing a

financial emergency may be eligible for financial help to pay for housing and utilities. Families that meet the following criteria may be eligible:

- The family must have a child who lives with a relative as defined for Work First Family Assistance
- Total income must be at or below 200% of poverty level
- The family has proof of identity and citizenship

Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) is a grant program for people with low incomes. It provides monthly payments to help pay for food, clothing, housing, utilities, transportation, phone, medical supplies not covered by Medicaid, and other basic needs. (TANF also helps states provide training and jobs for the people in welfare programs.)

FEDERAL EMERGENCY PRESCRIPTION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM TO OPEN FOR CERTAIN HELENE-

IMPACTED NORTH CAROLINA COUNTIES. The Emergency Prescription Assistance Program, or EPAP, helps people in a federally-identified disaster area who do not have health insurance get the prescription drugs, vaccinations, medical supplies, and equipment that they need. People who are eligible for EPAP can file a claim at more than <u>72,000 retail pharmaciesi</u> across the United States and its territories for prescription items that were lost, stolen, or destroyed because of a disaster. EPAP will open soon for certain Helene-impacted North Carolina counties.
